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Spiritual Gifts

In a recent Bible class we were discussing spiritual gifts in light of 1st Corinthians 12. This passage, is one of many that speaks on this subject and I think this subject is one that every Christian ought to spend some time thinking about. After all, several questions immediately come to mind when discussing spiritual gifts, for instance: What about talking in tongues, prophecy and healing? All of these things seem to be a normal part of life in the New Testament, so why don't we experience them today? Or, do some Christians actually experience this like they claim, but just not us Lutherans? Is there something to the so-called charismatic movement and these people on TV who claim direct revelation from God, claim to pray in strange tongues, and also claim to have the miraculous ability to heal?

Like I said, it's worth having an opinion on the matter especially when you encounter Charismatics who would question the sincerity of your faith. To respond quickly to this, the position of many Lutherans and other Christians throughout history is that God can and still does bestow miracles wherever and whenever He chooses. However, since the beginning of the church there have been false prophets and hypocrites claiming divine powers they do not have and leading people astray (you can read about it in the New Testament: Gal. 1:6-12, 2 Tim 3:14-4:5, 2 Peter 2, 1 John 4:1-6, etc.) Further, it seems that ever since the age of the Apostles, the kinds of amazing miraculous gifts mentioned in the New Testament have diminished significantly. The theory is, that these things were much more prevalent in the early church and these special manifestations of the Holy Spirit were gifts of grace which helped the young Church spread and reach more people with the Gospel of Jesus. However, this was before the New Testament was written or widely known. Now, since the Scriptures have been written and widely disseminated, the Spirit primarily works in a different way, namely, through His Word.

This is the short answer to a big question. Books have been written about this and those interested can search deeper. Ask me and I can talk with you about this or point you in the right direction for your own study. But the main question I wanted to address in writing on this topic has to do with another question that was raised in our class on 1st Corinthians 12.

In our class, someone said they had wondered if they too might have a spiritual gift, and if so, what it might be. Have you ever thought this way? If so, let me assure you that in fact, you do have spiritual gifts. How do I know this? Because every Christian does.

1st Corinthians 12:7 says: "To each is given the manifestation of the Spirit for the common good." This verse along with the rest of the passage assures us that every Christian has been blessed by the Holy Spirit. Paul goes on to teach how the members of the Church are like members of a body and how in our bodies, every part performs different tasks but works for the good of the whole. In the same way, just as everyone in the Church is blessed, so they ought to in turn use their gifts to bless others.

You should not wonder if you have a spiritual gift, but rather, which ones? Thinking about the unique ways God has blessed you and how you can use these gifts for building up the Body of Christ, is important to do. There are tools you can find online like "spiritual gifts assessments" which may help you reflect on these issues, but a much better way to assess your gifts is to talk to a close friend or someone knows you well. Ask a fellow Christian who is close to you and will tell you the truth -even if you don't want to hear it! This is important because even in Corinth, people were desiring gifts they did not have. So too, you may want badly to have a certain spiritual gift, but that might not be the one vou have received. Instead of working miracles or being a prophet (gifts that are truly rare and may not even be present in our age) you probably have far more common gifts that build up the church, for example: encouragement, giving, mercy. service, administration, discernment, teacher, evangelist, etc.

To consider what kinds of gifts you might have, you can read about the gifts that are mentioned in the Bible. But keep in mind, while Scripture gives lists of gifts in a number of places (Romans, 12:6-8, 1 Cor. 12:8-10, 28, Ephesians 4:11) these lists are not exhaustive. That is, we should not think as though these mentioned specifically are the only way the Spirit can bless. God can equip His Church however He sees fit.

In thinking about spiritual gifts, our task is to consider how we have been blessed by God and how we can use these blessings for the building up of the Church. So give it some thought. Think about how you can serve the Church and build up the body. Consider not what you have time to do or what you would like to do; but instead, think about what you have been gifted to do



HELP NEEDED


