Good News: Christ has defeated death.

I have had the occasion to think and talk a lot about death lately; more importantly, I have had the opportunity to proclaim the hope we have in Christ to the dying and to the grieving.

Longtime member of Lord of Life, Mavis Anderson, ended her long struggle with dementia and was called home on Wednesday Oct. 3rd. Her funeral will be on the 13th at 11:00. Mavis died the same day of Lauvenia Barry's funeral. Lauvenia died suddenly on Friday September 28th. Her death came as a complete shock. She was not sick or hospitalized, she was shopping with her daughter at a CVS pharmacy. She left her daughter at the register to get one more item, and was found a moment later lying on the floor. At this time Bob Nance and Barbara Botello are on hospice care and both Bob and Barbara, as well as their spouses, (Carol and Luis) would appreciate your prayers. Other members are also in poor and declining health dealing with all kinds of issues, and several are in their 80's and 90's and not getting any younger. No doubt, I will soon be speaking the same words of comfort to a different group of mourners.

When coming to terms with the death of a loved one, our faith in Christ and the hope we have on

St. Paul writes in Romans 4, 25 as follows: "Christ was delivered up for our trespasses, and was raised for our justification." Paul is indeed the man who extols Christ in a masterly manner, telling us exactly why and for what purpose he suffered and how we should conform ourselves to his sufferings, namely, that he died for our sins. This is a correct interpretation of the sufferings of Christ, by which we may profit. And as it is not sufficient to know and believe that Christ has died, so it will not suffice to know and believe that he rose with a transfigured body and is now in a state of joy and blessedness, no longer subject to mortality, for all this would profit me nothing or very little. But when I come to understand the fact that all the works God does in Christ are done for me, nay, they are bestowed upon and given to me, the effect of his resurrection being that I also will arise and live with him; that will cause me to rejoice. This must be brought home to our

account of His resurrection and victory over death, becomes much more palpable and profound than merely some historical truth we have acknowledged mechanically while reciting the creed. Martin Luther spoke in these terms about the resurrection of Christ, saying it is not merely some truth confessed with our mouths, but felt in our hearts. Below are some of Luther's comforting words regarding death and what Christ has done for us, cited from one of his Easter sermons. I commend them to your reading as I have recently commended so many similar words to the dying and the grieving. May these Gospel words comfort you and remind you of the simple, but profound truth at the heart of the Christian faith.

hearts, and we must not merely hear it with the ears of our body nor merely confess it with our mouth. ...

This is the meaning of the words by St. Paul: "Christ was raised for our justification." Here Paul turns my eyes away from my sins and directs them to Christ, for if I look at my sins, they will destroy me. Therefore I must look unto Christ who has taken my sins upon himself, crushed the head of the serpent and become the blessing. Now they no longer burden my conscience, but rest upon Christ, whom they desire to destroy. Let us see how they treat him. They hurl him to the ground and kill him. 0 God; where is now my Christ and my Saviour? But then God appears, delivers Christ and makes him alive; and not only does he make him alive, but he translates him into heaven and lets him rule over all. What has now become of sin? There it lies under his feet. If I then cling to this, I have a cheerful conscience like Christ, because I am without sin. Now I can defy death, the devil, sin and hell to do me any harm. As I am a child of Adam, they can indeed accomplish it that I must die. But since Christ has taken my sins upon himself, has died for them, has suffered himself to be slain on account of my sins, they can no longer harm me; for Christ is too strong for them, they cannot keep him, he breaks forth and overpowers them, ascends into heaven takes sin and sorrow captive, and rules there over all throughout eternity. Now I have a clear conscience, am joyful and happy and am no longer afraid of this tyrant, for Christ has taken my sins away from me and made them his own. But they cannot remain upon him; what then becomes of them? They must disappear and be destroyed. This then is the effect of faith. He who believes that Christ has taken away our sin, is without sin, like Christ himself, and death, the devil and hell are vanguished as far as he is concerned and they can no longer harm him.

Daily Devotion (From Lutheran Hour Ministries)...

Psalm 116:4-7 Then I called on the Name of the Lord: "O Lord, I pray, deliver my soul!" Gracious is the Lord, and righteous; our God is merciful. The Lord preserves the simple; when I was brought low, He saved me. Return, O my soul, to your rest; for the Lord has dealt bountifully with you.

"Mom! Mom! Are you there? Mom!"

I ran out of my room at the top of our rather steep second-story steps to the sound of mounting panic in my five-year-old son's voice. This time he was attempting to slide down the banister that is fixed only a few inches from the wall and had gotten his leg stuck. He had one remaining toe holding him on the step and nowhere to go but down!

Despite images of what might have happened if I had not reached him in time, I couldn't help but laugh. This boy's insatiable desire to try life from every angle is one of my favorite things about him! And while I certainly have my crabby moments as his mother, I also delight to save him from danger and help him discover ways to experience life to its fullest.

In this psalm, David gives voice to his own experience of being rescued. He sings the praises of a son who, free to explore, has been pulled back from the edge by his parent's loving embrace. His testimony here bears witness to God as a gracious parent. This is the same God, our Heavenly Father, who spared not His own Son, but gave Him up for us all (see Romans 8:32).

Some of us never knew the security of loving earthly parents and are tempted to read this passage with the old fear and shame experienced when needing to be saved. Even those of us with great parents know that they (and all of us) fall woefully short of God's perfect parenting. So, it's easy to imagine God being grumpy, disappointed, and disapproving when we yet again need help.

But that's not the kind of God we have.

Zephaniah 3:17 says, "The Lord your God is in your midst, a Mighty One who will save; He will rejoice over you with gladness; He will quiet you by His love; He will exult over you with loud singing." This is not a begrudging God! This is a loving Father who delights, much as I did in that moment with my son, to intervene for our good.

What a joy to know that rather than berate us for our shortcomings and our failures, we have a Savior who is merciful, patient, and understanding of our weaknesses, because He has been like us.

As the writer of Hebrews says, "For surely it is not angels that He helps, but He helps the offspring of Abraham. Therefore, He had to be made like His brothers in every respect, so that He might become a merciful and faithful High Priest in the service of God, to make propitiation for the sins of the people" (Hebrews 2:16-17).

THE PRAYER: Dear Jesus, as the bumps and bruises of life tempt us to be silent in our troubles, please remind us to call out unashamed for Your salvation, again and again, knowing that You are for us -- *always*. In Your Name, Jesus, we pray. Amen.

It is really amazing how many things teenagers are into these days. When I was growing up in Plano in the late 1970s and early 1980s (yes, I realize I just dated myself), there was a number of extracurricular activities that teens could be involved in. Most of them revolved around sports. Plano was an up and coming community with rapid growth in population and new businesses. New schools were being constructed and completed on an annual basis. This meant a lot of families with kids were moving to the area and the Plano Parks and Recreation Department could hardly keep up with the demand for practice and game space to accommodate all of the sporting activities. Of course there were the school sports teams for middle school aged kids and older, but it seemed like the number of participants in the recreational leagues was much greater. Part of the reason for this is the concept of private club teams had not been conceived back then. The three sports I mainly competed in were soccer, baseball, and basketball. But today, participating in sports is not the dominant activity for youth as it was thirty to forty years ago.

The lives of young people in the Jr. and Sr. IMPACT youth groups at Lord of Life are very busy with many different kinds of activities. Some of our families have multiple kids who are all heavily involved in one or more after-school events requiring parents to spend many hours on the road as taxis to multiple destinations. My wife and I only had two boys and we thought our lives were busy when they were teens! I have five words for those parents today; I am praying for you! Where am I going with this? Well, here are just a few things that the Jr. High and high school kids at Lord of Life are involved in.

Sports include football, baseball, soccer, volleyball, equestrian, cross-country, areal aerobics, drill team or cheerleading, and school sponsored fishing. There are six youth (boys and girls) involved in scout troops and 4 are working on their Eagle Scout projects. Music is a big part of their lives whereas 13 youth play instruments such as trumpet, French horn, saxophone, clarinet, violin, harp, bass drum, hand bells, organ, and piano. 3 are in school marching bands and one is a Drum Major. A few have participated in the Dallas Children's Chorus and some currently sing in their school choirs. I am sure that there could be more things added to this list that I am currently unaware of. What I am thankful for is that these youth (and you have to include the parents) commit to be involved in worship, Bible class, youth events, and fundraisers at Lord of Life. It is good that you live life to the fullest, but it is even greater to live your life to the glory of God. All of the talents, abilities, and gifts you are given come from him, just as the gift of salvation through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. In all of our endeavors we practice to be perfect, but the reality is we will never be perfect due to our sinful nature. We need forgiveness; the forgiveness only God can give through His Word and Sacraments in worship and study.


